Philosophical Issues of Feminism (PHL 356)

This course introduces students to central concepts, thinkers, and issues in feminist theory. Students will engage with philosophical writing along with popular media to explore three major themes: What are sex and gender? What is gender oppression? And what is a "good" body? Topics will include the relation between biology, sex, and gender; intersectionality; the harms of stereotyping; and the ethics of beauty practices and weight-loss dieting. A variety of feminist perspectives and approaches will be considered. Throughout the semester, there will be opportunities to consider how course material pertains to current events and personal experiences.

Please note that this course will regularly discuss topics of violence, harassment, and oppression.

Course goals

In this course, students will:

- Engage with feminist theoretical writing and popular media to gain familiarity with key issues, theories, and debates within feminism;
- Build a conceptual "toolbox" of theories and insights from a variety of feminist perspectives and traditions;
- Practice using feminist conceptual tools to analyze and critique current events and personal experiences;
- Practice communicating theoretical concepts, analyses, and evaluations clearly and persuasively to others in and outside our class.

Course texts

All texts and media (podcasts, films, blog posts, etc.) will be available on D2L.

Course structure

This course will be held in person. All materials will be distributed through the course website on D2L. The professor will communicate with the class through D2L and by email. Please note that this course requires regular group work and class discussion. As per university policy, masks will be required at all times in class until further notice.
